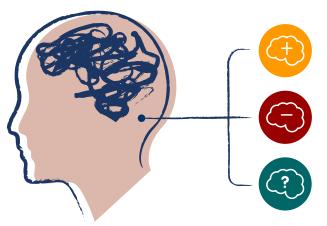
Cognitive Impairment Associated with Schizophrenia

SCHIZOPHRENIA IS CHARACTERIZED BY:1,2



Positive symptoms:

delusions, hallucinations, disorganized speech and behavior, agitation

Negative symptoms:

blunted affect, emotional withdrawal, loss of motivation, social avoidance, lack of pleasure

Cognitive symptoms:

cessation or impairment of normal cognitive processes

How does it impact people?

Cognitive impairment associated with schizophrenia (CIAS) affects

of people,3 with symptoms

Executive dysfunction

Cognitive impairments can present early in the disease course and are often fully developed when people present with a first episode^{4,5,6}



CIAS often presents independent of positive symptoms;⁷ in the absence of positive symptoms, cognitive symptoms still remain⁶

CIAS predicts a reduction in realworld functioning as it impacts:1,2,6

- Daily life, e.g. self-care, cooking
- **Employment**
- Social functioning
- Relationships
- Health-related quality of life
- Adherence to treatment





CIAS may contribute to poor treatment adherence, which can result in relapse or rehospitalization²

UNMET NEED:

CIAS has been reported by patients and caregivers to be one of the most burdensome symptoms of their condition^{2,8,9}

There are currently **no approved pharmacotherapies** targeting CIAS⁶
